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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In my report to the Board on December 14, 1977, I reviewed our activities for the year to that date and I projected our plans and areas of increased emphasis for 1978.

In this final report on IHF's performance for 1977, I must first make the point that a steadily decreasing cash-flow deficit is some indication of progress. On the other hand, if this had not been accompanied by very real increases in our staff strength, and in our office and professional equipment, no one could be completely satisfied on that score alone. In 1975, our cash deficit was over \$25,000, and in 1976, it was nearly \$24,000. For 1977, we showed a deficit of a little over \$7,000, and this included \$2,000 which was uncovered as still owing the government on contracts the Foundation had prior to 1972, for which the accounting records left much to be desired.

Over this period, we have built up our staff by the addition of an assistant librarian, two industrial hygiene engineers, an analytical chemist, a toxicology technician, a print shop operator, and a part-time literature searcher. In addition, we have gradually added to our field and laboratory instrumentation, and our office machinery, until at present, we are quite well equipped.

In spite of losses in both laboratories, 1977 operating expense was only \$5,394 over income.

Although meetings and courses recorded a small loss, income from this area did very well as compared to budget. Some extraordinary costs associated with the Chicago course unfortunately forced expenses considerably over budget. Actually, the loss in this area relates almost exactly to the expenses incurred in preparing the Management Course which had to be cancelled because of the poor response.

Another measure of performance for any given year is the gain or loss in the number of members and the resultant change in dues. In this area, we did not do well in 1977. We acquired 14 new members, and lost 13. However, among those we lost were several in group 1 and 2, and the net loss in dues was \$7,000.

The increasing acceptance of our laboratory services, survey work, courses, and administrative projects are, in my view, very healthy signs, and confirm my impression that we have reached a turning point in the fortunes of IHF. Of even greater significance, is the improved position we now enjoy with respect to the staff and the equipment necessary to render our services accurately, and in a timely manner.

As to the year ahead, we have every reason to believe we can add to the membership and increase our training activities. Literature searches, toxicology studies and project work are all becoming more active and if, as the Executive Committee proposed, the Trustees' Fund can be re-activated, we should be able to obtain some much needed maintenance to our building and some additional laboratory equipment.

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OFFICE SERVICES

Membership

Any organization with a legitimate interest in industrial health and hygiene or environmental and occupational health may apply for membership in IHF. The Board of Trustees considers all applications, and an applicant becomes a member upon a favorable vote of a majority of the Board.

At the beginning of the year, IHF's membership totaled 149 companies, associations and special groups, and 14 new members joined during the year. However, the loss of 13 resulted in a negligible change in the total number.

Responsibility for expanding membership is shared by the staff, the Board of Trustees, and each IHF member. Dues are scaled to the total number of employees. Member companies receive special discounts on publications, reduced registration fees to all meetings and courses, and special rates on analytical services. Savings that result can actually exceed the cost of membership.

IHF serves as a medium for voluntary action by member companies, large or small, individually or collectively, and as a center to which they can turn for assistance with all health-related problems.

New Equipment and Furnishings

A new secretarial desk and chair, an IBM Memory typewriter, and a checkwriter for the accounting department were acquired during the year.

The donation of a fine wood executive desk from PPG Industries was gratefully received by the Foundation, and an executive chair and credenza were purchased to improve the office of the Director of Office Services.

ENGINEERING AND OCCUPATIONAL MEDICINE SERVICES

A plant survey provides management with an objective, detailed evaluation of the industrial hygiene and/or safety aspects of its facilities with particular reference to the provisions of the OSHA Act. During the year 35 such surveys were carried out for members. In addition, five combined engineering and medical surveys were conducted.

A medical survey provides a current review of the occupational health aspects of a company's plant or corporate facilities. Six such surveys were carried out for members during the year, one of which is on a continuing basis for consultation on employee health matters.

Surveys included sampling for asbestos, organic vapors, solvents, and silica as well as noise levels and the evaluation of waste disposal. In addition, the industrial hygienists worked with the manufacturers of a special filtering device to evaluate the efficiency of filters used in connection with compressors to assure Type 1, Grade D quality air.

A remote oxygen sensor was added to the engineering equipment as was a CO calibration kit.

INFORMATION SERVICES

Responsible for answering inquiries, conducting literature searches and publishing the Industrial Hygiene Digest as well as the Memos and proceedings, this department has carried out work in all these areas in 1977. Over 1400 abstracts were published in the monthly Industrial Hygiene Digest. Circulation of the Digest is over 1,850, seventy percent distributed to members as a part of their dues.

The proceedings of the Symposium on Selenium-Tellurium in the Environment were published and three issues of Memos to Members were printed. The Memos contained news articles on occupational safety and health as well as items of interest on IHF's activities and programs. This publication is circulated to members without charge.

Literature searches were conducted on creosote and silicosis. More than 600 inquiries were handled among which were 54 short, one-hour literature searches.

MEETINGS AND COURSES

The training course and meeting program for 1977 was very well received. On January 12-13, the thirteenth Engineering Discussional attracted 45 representatives from member companies. The Discussionals are open to members, only, with no registration fee. They are structured to provide a mutual exchange of information and discussion of problems in industrial hygiene and safety engineering.

On April 12-14, a training course and workshop on the Fundamentals of Industrial Hygiene Engineering was conducted in co-sponsorship with the Pittsburgh Section of the American Industrial Hygiene Association. An

intermediate level course on Recognition, Evaluation and Control of Occupational Health Hazards was given by IHF on November 14-16. Seventy-eight members and 20 non-members participated in these courses.

The course on New Concepts of Occupational Medicine Under OSHA for plant medical directors and physicians with part-time industrial affiliation was held in Pittsburgh on two successive weekends in May, and repeated in Chicago on August 13-16 and in Los Angeles on November 7-10. Approved for 24 credit hours in Category I of the AMA's Physician's Recognition Award and 24 Elective Hours by the American Academy of Family Physicians, the courses were attended by 110 physicians.

Occupational Health Update, A Training Course for Occupational Health Nurses, was conducted on September 22-23. Ninety nurses attended this course and each received 1.2 continuing education units from the American Nurses Association for their participation.

A Symposium on the Health Aspects of Chromium Containing Materials, held on September 15 in Baltimore, Maryland and co-sponsored by the Organization Resources Counselors, dealt with safe and healthful ways to use chromium containing materials in pigment manufacture, painting, plating, and wood preservation.

Attendees for all programs totaled 399, of which about 60 percent were representing member companies. Unfortunately, the Seminar for Managers on Health Regulations Under OSHA scheduled for October 11 in Pittsburgh had to be cancelled because of insufficient registration. It would appear that managers are leaving the problems related to adhering to OSHA's regulations to the technical personnel in their companies.

LABORATORY SERVICES

Analytical Laboratory

Tests are performed on environmental samples collected with filters, impingers and charcoal tubes, and biological samples of blood and urine. Over 2,680 samples were analyzed during the year. Analyses included asbestos fiber counts, metals, fluorides as well as organic solvents, vinyl chloride and free silica. The laboratory is accredited by the American Industrial Hygiene Association, and because of the increasing number of biological sample requests, accreditation from the Center for Disease was applied for in December.

Toxicology Laboratory

Located in the Eureka Building in the Oakland section of Pittsburgh, the Toxicology Laboratory conducts long- and short-term animal studies on materials or products. All procedures are in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Hazardous Substances Act. During 1977 four short-term studies were carried out as well as a sub-acute feeding study on two inorganic materials. Also, a long-term inhalation study was initiated on a fibrous material.

PROJECTS

Epidemiology Studies

An extensive morbidity and mortality epidemiology study is in process on the health effects of work in a chemical industry. Field work and data collection is being carried out by IHF personnel and statistical consultation, data processing, and computer time are being provided by the University of Pittsburgh, Department of Biostatistics in the Graduate School of Public Health under contract to IHF.

Administrative

IHF serves as technical advisor, administrative coordinator, and treasurer for special health and safety committees of three industry groups. The objectives of these committees is to investigate possible adverse health effects of exposure to the chemicals, compounds and materials found in their particular industry. One committee includes foreign companies, and meetings for that group have been held in London and Munich as well as in various locations in the United States.

These industry groups have found they can work more effectively and more economically through collective action than they could as individual companies. IHF provides the aegis under which they may meet and exchange ideas for the solution of problems of industrial and environmental health, within the restraints of the Anti Trust Laws.

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STAFF ACTIVITIES

Dr. Braun was guest speaker at a corporate management meeting of the SCM Corporation on June 6, 1977 in Mobile, Alabama. His talk was on maintaining good working relations with the community and plant physicians.

On September 7, Dr. Braun presented a paper on "The Role of Enzymes in Byssinosis" at the Medichem Conference in San Francisco. Medichem is a committee of the Permanent Commission and International Organization on Occupational Health. It is concerned with health in the chemical industries.

Professional staff members also lecture at IHF's training courses. Dr. Braun spoke on "The Changing Responsibilities of Industrial Physicians" at the three physicians courses. Mr. Brlan lectured on "The Role of the Industrial Hygiene Engineer" at the physicians courses and assisted with the Workshops on Gas and Vapor Evaluation at the industrial hygiene courses. Mr. Speicher also assisted with these workshops and gave the talk on Ventilation.

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MINUTES

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING OF MEMBERS

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Edward J. Slack, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Brian reported that 89 proxies had been received, which represented 59% of the IHF members, and in accordance with our By-Laws, constituted a quorum.

Minutes of the last Annual Business Meeting, held on October 27, 1976, were read by Mr. Brian, and since there were no objections, Chairman Slack declared the minutes approved as read.

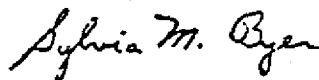
