The above entitled matter came on for hearing before the undersigned referee of the Industrial Commission, pursuant to due notice, at Minneapolis on March 25 and 26, 1963, and on said latter date the parties advised that they had reached an agreement and dictated a stipulation for settlement into the record, a copy of which is hereto attached and made a part hereof. The referee has considered the pleadings, the testimony taken, and the stipulation, and finding the facts recited in said agreement to be true and that the same is in substantial accord with the provisions of the workmen's compensation law of Minnesota,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED That F. S. Lamson Company, employer, and the Travelers Insurance Company be and the same are hereby dismissed.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS CONSIDERED AND DETERMINED That this employe is entitled to and he is hereby awarded compensation against the above named employers and insurers in the due and payable one lump sum without interest deduction of \$13,500.00 representing 300 weeks at \$45.00 per week, payable as follows:

Anchor Casualty Company \$3,375.00 to Robins, Davis and Lyons of St. Paul as stipulated attorneys' fees, which when paid shall constitute complete satisfaction for all legal services rendered herein, and \$775.00 to employe.



Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company the sum of \$4,150.00 to employe.

American Mutual Liability Insurance Company the sum of \$2,750.00 to employe.

Central Surety and Insurance Corporation the sum of \$800.00 to the employe.

New Amsterdam Casualty Company the sum of \$350.00 to employe.

Manufacturers Casualty Insurance Company the sum of \$350.00 to employe.

United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company the sum of \$250.00 to employe.

Bituminous Casualty Corporation the sum of \$700.00 to employe.

And, in addition, reimbursement by Standard Accident Insurance Company the sum of \$1,500.00 to employe for payment by him of medical, hospital, and related expense. Said payments when made shall constitute full, final, and complete settlement of any and all claims of any character or description, including compensation, medical, hospital, and related items, resulting from employe's temporary total or other disabilities claimed to have been the result of occupational diseases of asbestosis or silicosis or otherwise incurred while in the employ of the above named employers from 1919 to October 2, 1959.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED That all petitions filed herein be dismissed.

Noble, Jr., Legal Department, Secretary's Office, Lancaster have been jointly handling this case since it first came to our attention in October, 1962.

This is in answer to the questions raised in your letter of November 16 addressed to our former plant location in Camden, New Jersey.

Cork pipe covering and cork board production was discontinued in our Camden, New Jersey, Plant in 1953 and the plant was subsequently sold on December 30, 1955. Some of the production facilities were transferred to our Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania, Plant and cork pipe covering and cork board was manufactured there until 1959 when production of all cork products at this plant was discontinued.

We believe this is the information you are seeking although we find it difficult to associate it with a workmen's compensation claim based on silicosis.

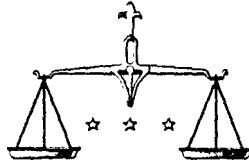

We are the insurance carrier for the Armstrong Cork Co. whose operations are located throughout the country.

A workman's compensation claim has been made against our named insured in which we are assuming the investigations as their carrier. The claimant alleges a silicosis injury.

Would you please be so kind as to advise us what proportion of the asbestos covering that you manufacture (which we suppose is a form of paper) is asbestos and how much dust there would be per million cubic units of air if this were released into the air? I believe the same information would also apply to asbestos paste or material that is used to apply it as well. This is, of course only for our information and if it is necessary, we may not need to reveal this information, but it would be a good background for our compensation attorneys in handling this claim. Our attorney Mr. C. A. Stark of Minneapolis, Minnesota states that it is his belief that there is very little free asbestos dust per cubic foot of air when this material is being used in some kind of a wet paste to be applied to pipes and other materials that are used in the cooling or heating or refrigerating systems.

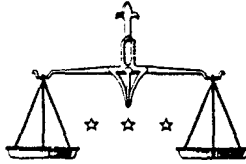

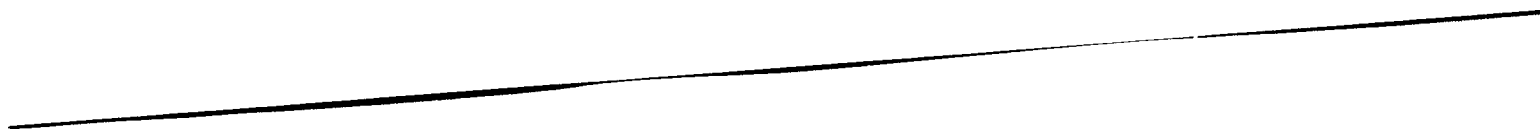

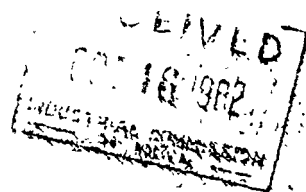

IV.

On the 2nd day of October, 1959, employee, while working at his occupation as an asbestos worker for the Smith-Sharpe Company in Belle Plaine, Minnesota, became disabled from the occupational disease asbestosis, and the said employer, Smith-Sharpe Company, was the last employer who employed the employee in the employment to the nature of which the occupational disease of asbestosis was due and contracted. Since October 2, 1959, the employee has been totally disabled from pursuing any occupation which brings him an income by reason of said asbestosis and is in fact permanently and totally disabled.

V.

The employer, Smith-Sharpe Company, had due notice and knowledge of employee's disablement within ninety (90) days and said employer, among others, was duly served with a verified claim on or about September 19, 1961.

VI.

It is the employee's claim that his original disablement from the occupational disease asbestosis occurred on the 28th day of October, 1955, while in the employ of Asbestos Products, Inc. in Pine Bend, Minnesota, which disablement totally incapacitated employee for a period of several months. Employee submitted to a medical examination at the request of one of the insurance carriers of Asbestos Products, Inc. and was erroneously advised by the doctor for said insurance carrier that his symptoms were due to an "allergic asthma" unrelated to his occupation.

Employee, acting on this information and additional medical advice traveled to the State of Arizona to obtain relief, but neither medical treatment nor a change of climate for his alleged asthma materially helped his symptoms, principally shortness of breath, and employee found himself unable to pursue his occupation with any degree of regularity.

VII.

Whereas employee's annual earnings in 1954, the last full year he was able to work at his trade, were in the sum of \$6915.33, his earnings following disablement on October 28, 1955, were as follows:

VIII.

Following contraction of asbestosis on October 28, 1955, employee was forced to seek medical care and attention, hospitalization and drugs, which to date total the sum of \$2033.75. The employee will be required in the future to expend additional sums of money for drugs and medical care.

WHEREFORE, Pursuant to the Occupational Disease provisions of the 1957 Minnesota Workmen's Compensation Act, in particular but not limited to § 176.66(5), this employee petitions for an award for the total compensation and medical expenses

to date due from Smith-Sharp Company, the employer who last employed the employee in the employment to the nature of which his occupational disease is due. If on the evidence such disability was contracted while employee was in the employment of a prior employer or employers, this employee petitions the Industrial Commission to take sufficient evidence so as to enable the employer who is made liable for the total claim to be granted an apportionment of such compensation among the several employers who, since the contracting of said disease, employed this employee in the employment to the nature of which his occupational disease is due.
