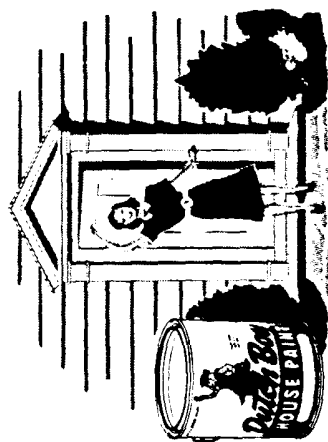

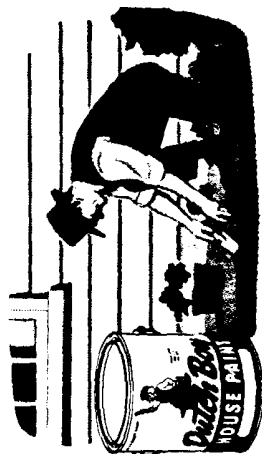

Paint Point #1

Weather-worn spots, places which usually show the first signs of deterioration, should certainly be checked and fixed up before a brushful of paint is applied to your house.

These danger spots include the foundation, the bases of porch columns, porch steps, windows, doors, gutters and many similar wear-points on the outside of your house.

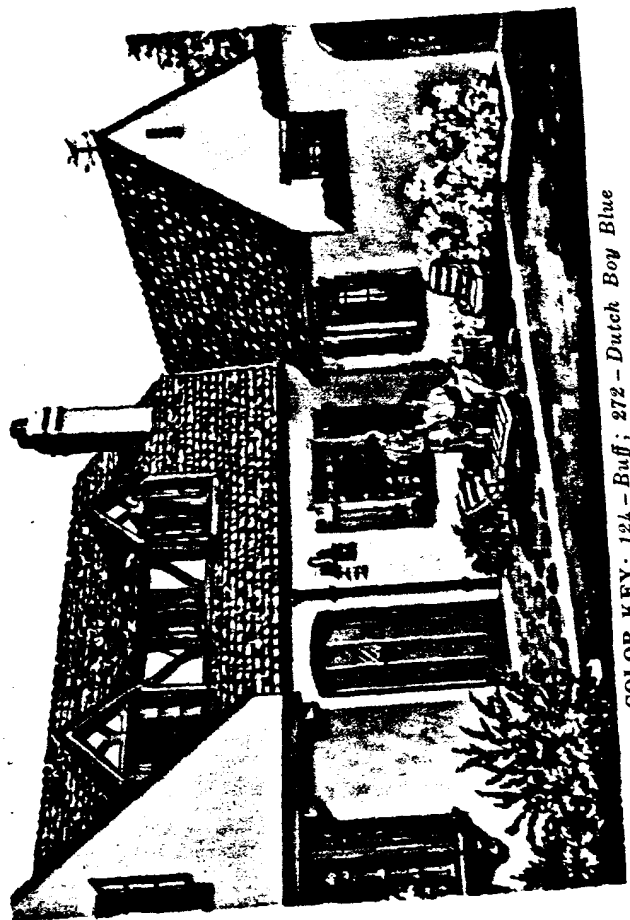

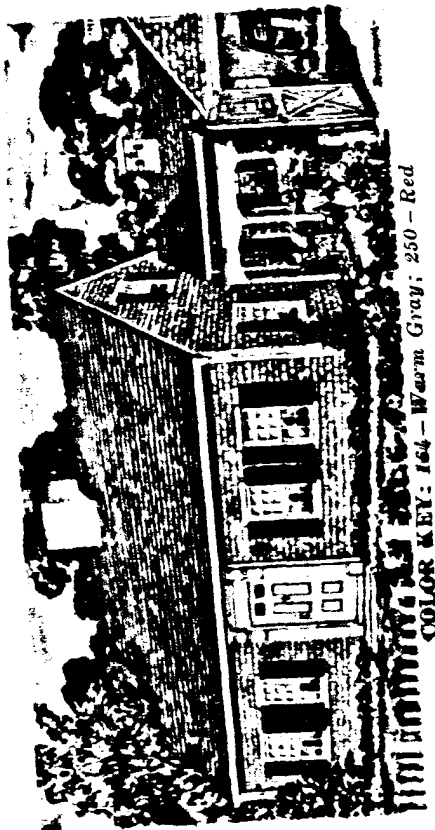
Paint Point #2

Color styling, one of the most important factors to be considered when selecting a color scheme for the outside of your house, can be applied to any type of dwelling—and should be a very definite part of your painting plans.

While other factors, such as the type or period of a house, merit some thought before painting, it is essential to consider what a remarkable effect color has on size. If your house is small, white or another light color will make it appear larger than a house of similar size painted a dark color. On the other hand, a house too large for its surroundings will appear smaller when painted a dark color, while a light color will only tend to magnify its size.

This is only one example of the many phases of color styling—all of which should play an important part in the painting and decoration of your home.

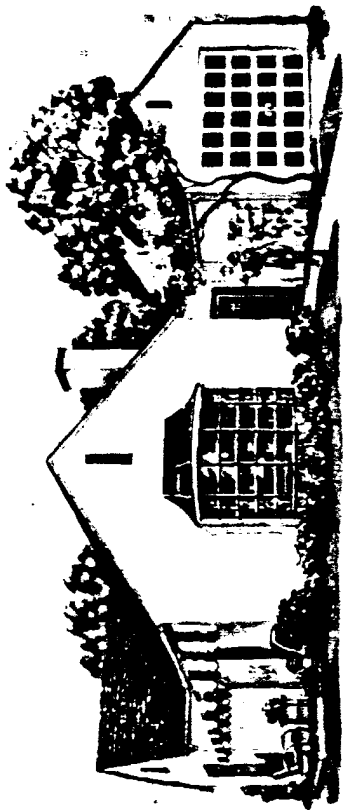

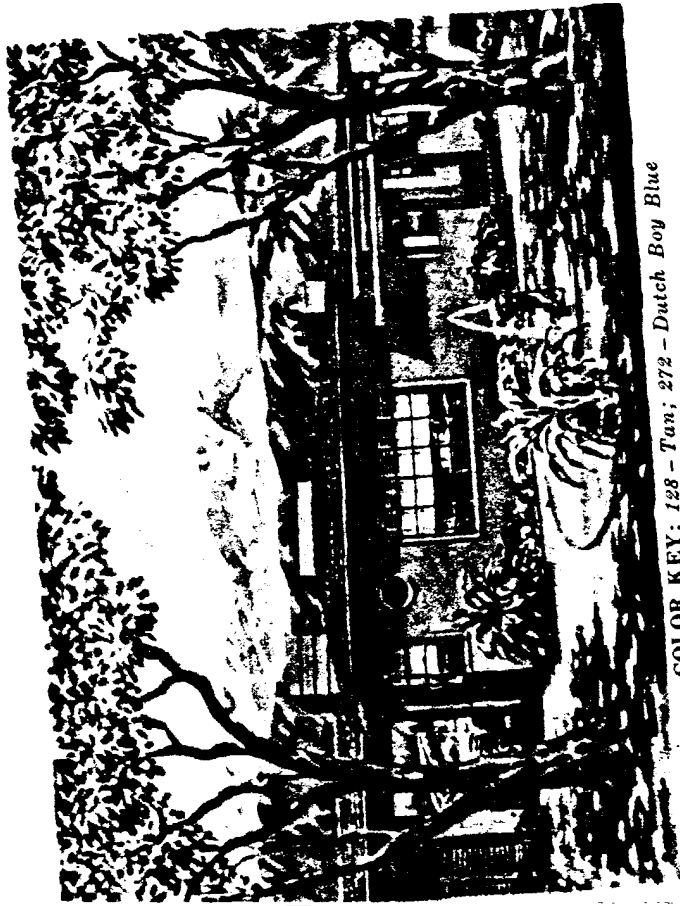
Paint Point #3

The location of your house certainly should have some bearing on your decision as to what color it will be painted. For example, if you live near a manufacturing district your best choice might be gray, while white, or some very light color, makes a nice contrast for a house on a tree-lined suburban street.

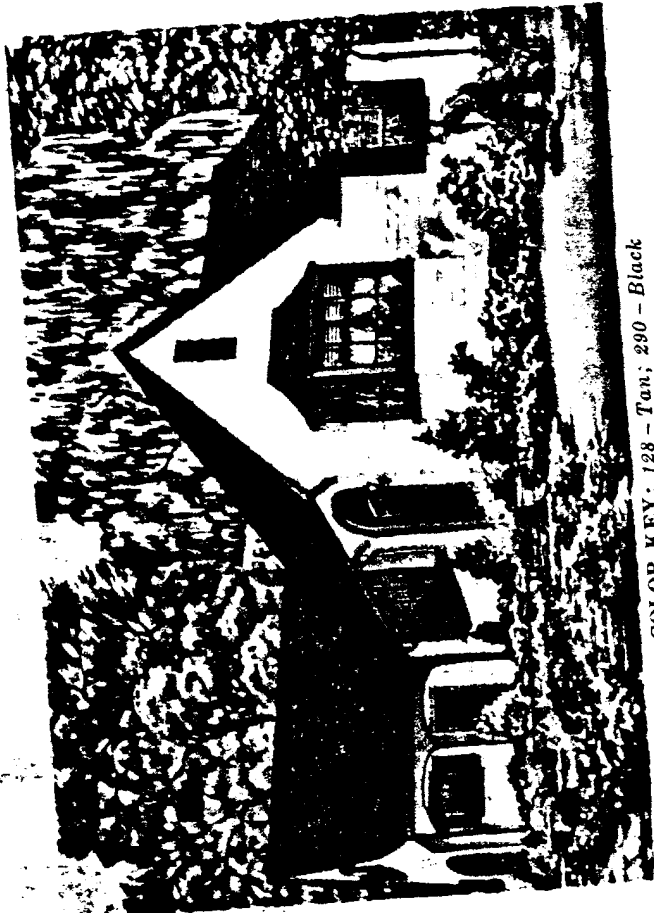
Those of you who live in a year-round sunny climate will find a light tint your logical choice, since dark colors absorb heat from the sun's rays while light colors reflect that heat. Then too, if your house is close to others, your choice of color should be based on adjacent structures to avoid an unpleasant clash.

Regardless of your location, "Dutch Boy" Blended Paint includes a line of tints that are sure to fulfill your needs. Formulated to have and hold that crisp, clean look, these "Dutch Boy" tints are available in a green, buff, ivory, tan, cream, two shades of gray and colonial yellow.

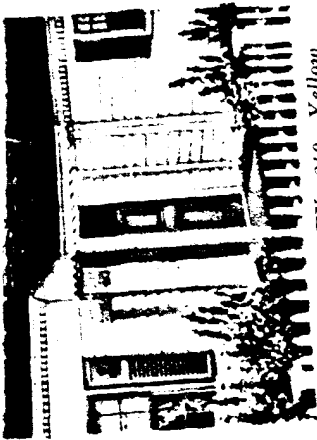

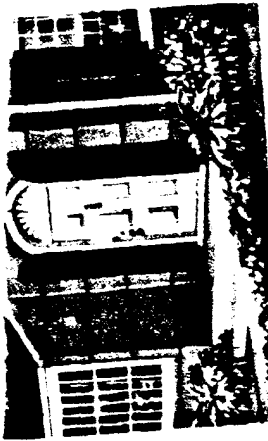
COLOR KEY: 128 - Tan; 272 - Dutch Boy Blue

Paint Point #4

Lincoln's famous remark about the common people might be paraphrased to say "People must like white houses — you see so many of them".

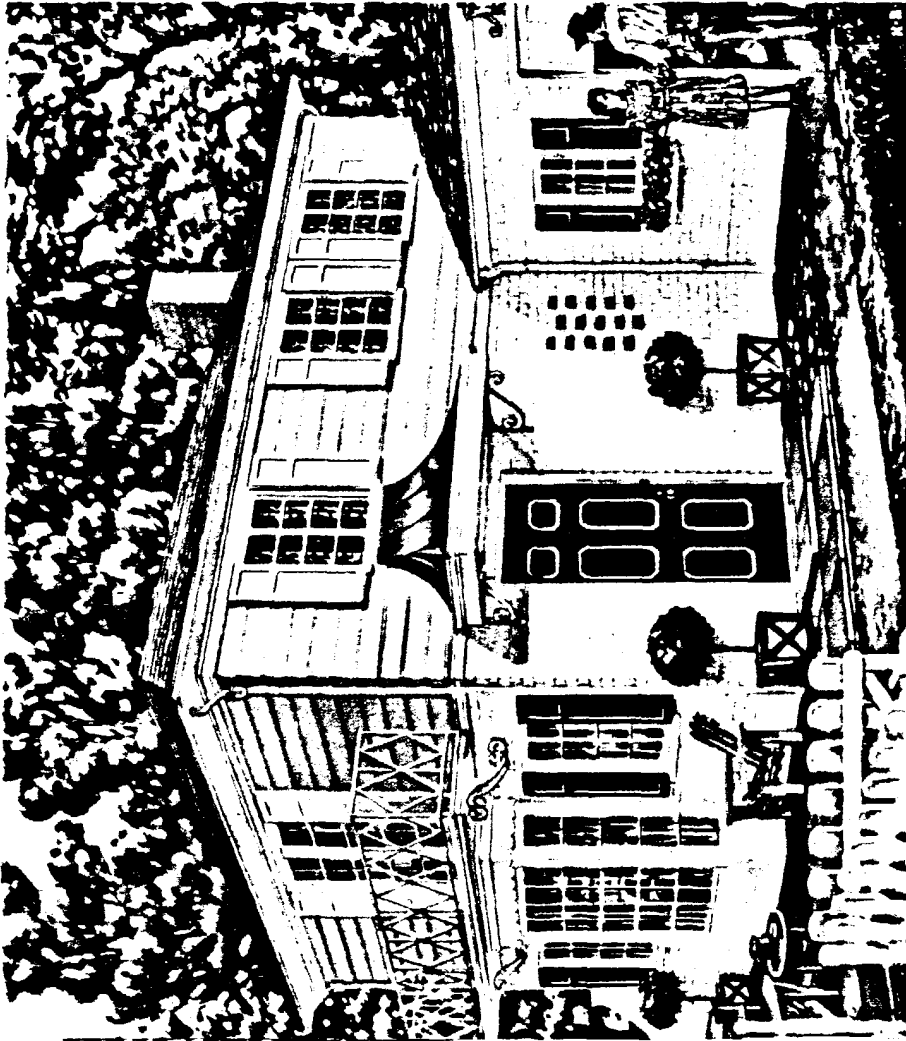
There must be a reason for this outstanding preference for white. Probably one of the best is the way in which white paint affects apparent size. For example, two houses can be exactly the same as to shape and dimension, and yet one of those houses, painted white, will appear considerably larger than its counterpart, painted another color.

Another reason for white is that a house painted white, according to the U. S. Bureau of Standards, can be as much as 15 degrees cooler in direct sunlight. This is true, of course, because white reflects heat while dark colors absorb it.

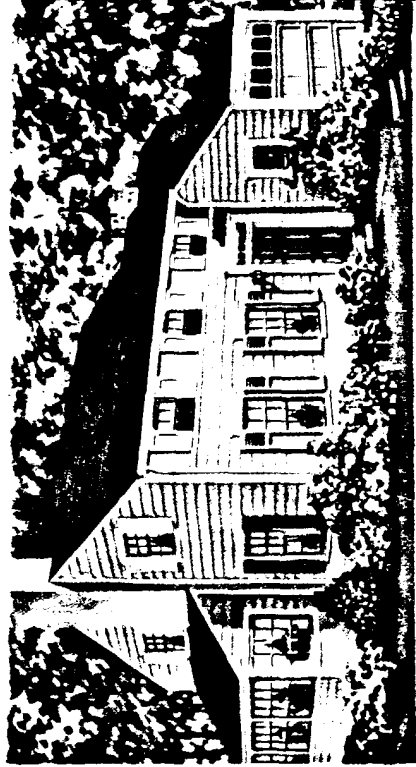
White, too, is "safe". Practically any type or shape of house looks well in white, particularly if it is "Dutch Boy's" new *Blended Bright White*. Here is a white blended to *stay white* because its self-cleaning action removes dust and dirt. Trim colors, too, seem even richer and deeper against this dazzling contrast.

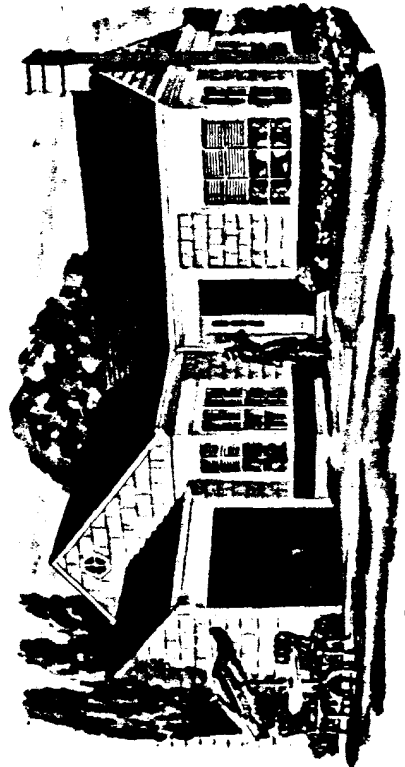

Paint Point #5

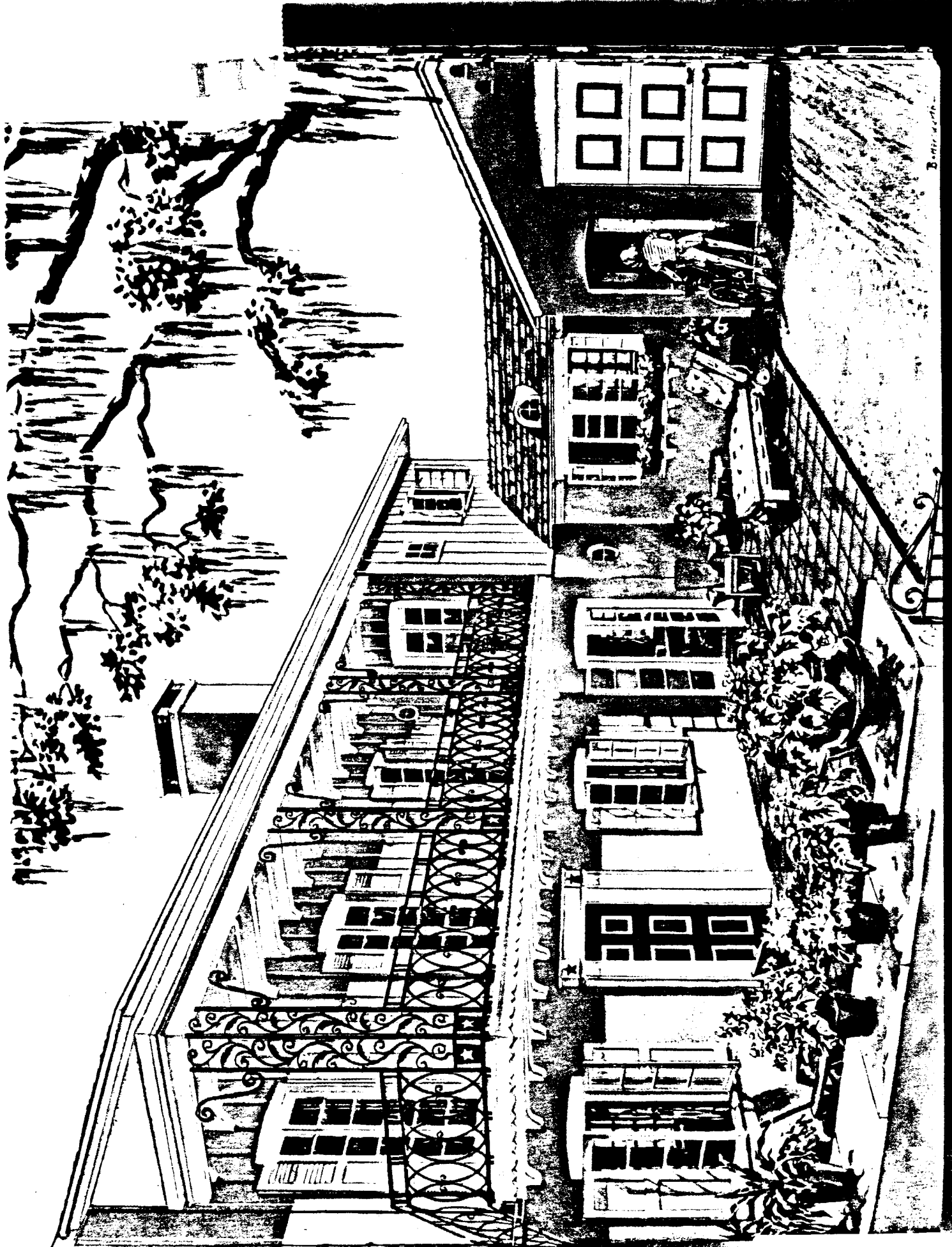
For a satisfactory paint job it is necessary that the entire surface of your house be prepared for painting. This includes such things as sandpapering and dusting the surface, clearing out the roof gutters, nailing down loose clapboards and shingles, replacing any small pieces that are missing, scraping off any loose paint, touching up bare spots, removing loose putty from the sash, and burning and scraping off all the old paint if the surface is badly blistered or scaled.

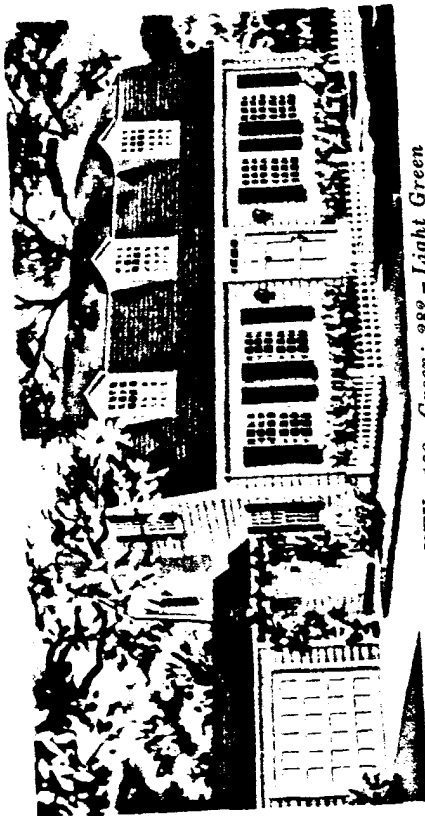

COLOR KEY: 122 - Cream; 230 - Brown



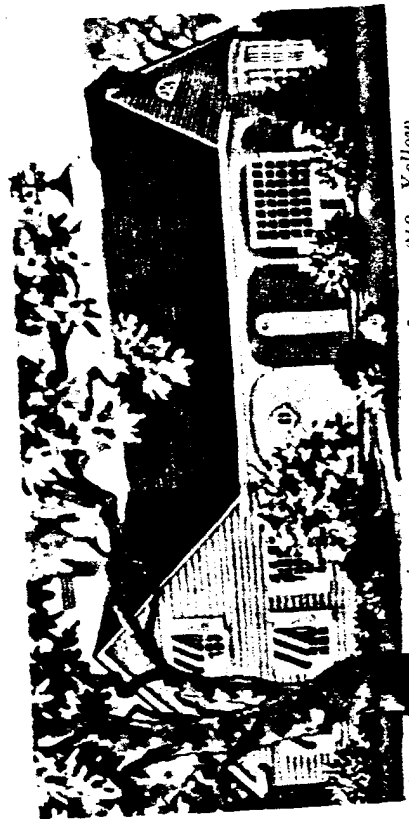

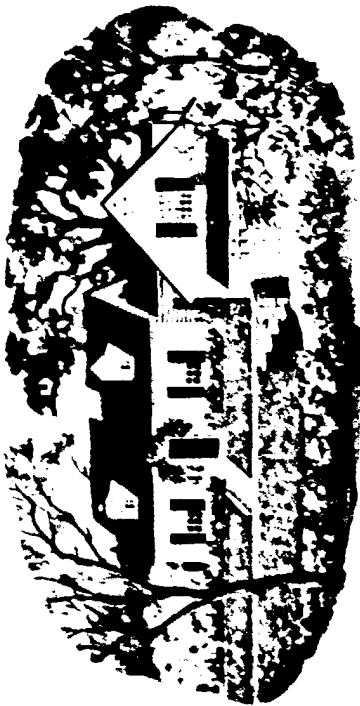

Paint Point #6

Your first consideration, when painting, should be the large areas of your house. However, almost every house has attractive little details, and the correct handling of these details can make your house distinctive in appearance—make yours a house that stands out from the commonplace.

Objects such as doors, shutters, fences, the underside of porch roofs and even chimneys can be “enlivened” with color—the same way that a new automobile is brightened with chrome decorations.

For example, consider the lowly garden fence. Think how much additional interest a simple striping line can add to it! Shutters, porch ceiling, chimneys and projecting eaves can also be “touched off” with a banding line—lending just the right note of individuality to your home.

These are only a few of the many decorative details which you can brighten up with color. Look around your home and you’re sure to find many more which merit a place in your painting plans.

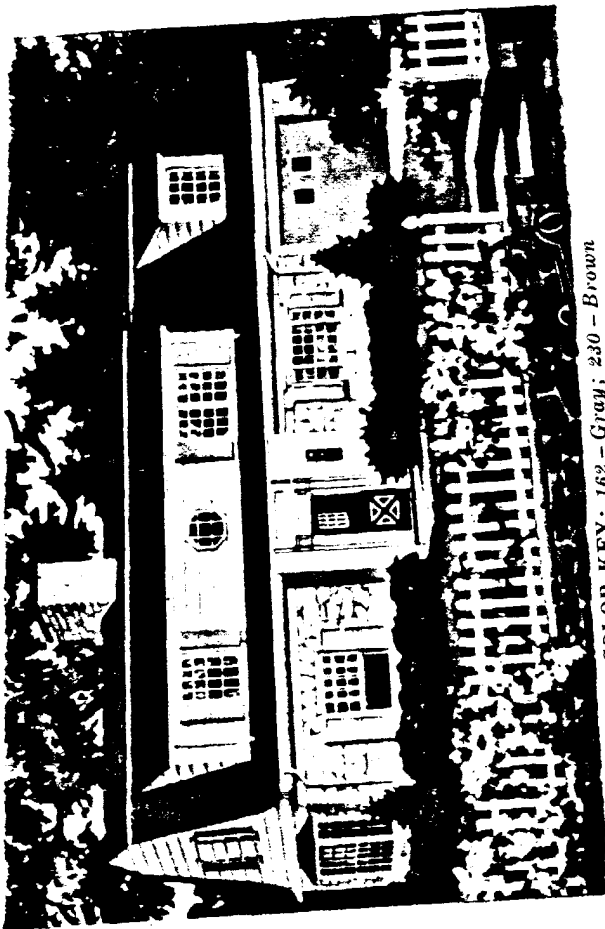

Paint Point #7

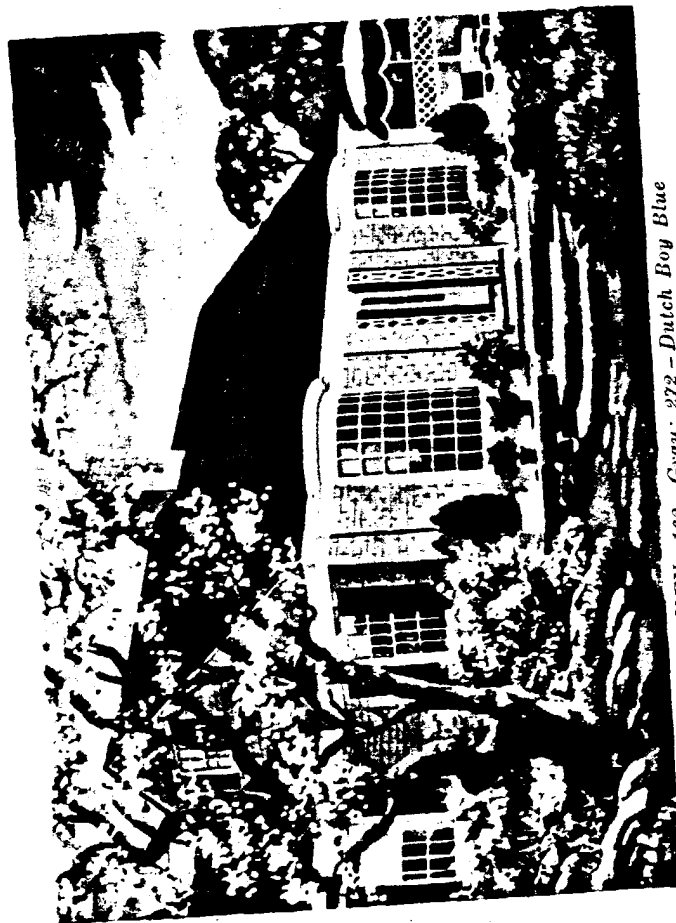
Before hiring a painter, take the opportunity to check the details of his estimate. First of all, make sure the estimate covers everything you *want* painted — the house itself including sash and trim, the roof, the blinds or shutters, screens, the leaders and gutters, the garage, fences or any other surfaces you have in mind. In addition, this estimate should specify the number of coats on each item.

Then, too, be sure the painter's estimate also includes an allowance for surface preparation. Such things as sandpapering and dusting, cleaning out gutters, replacing any small pieces that may be missing, nailing down loose boards — all such necessary work should be covered by his price quotation.

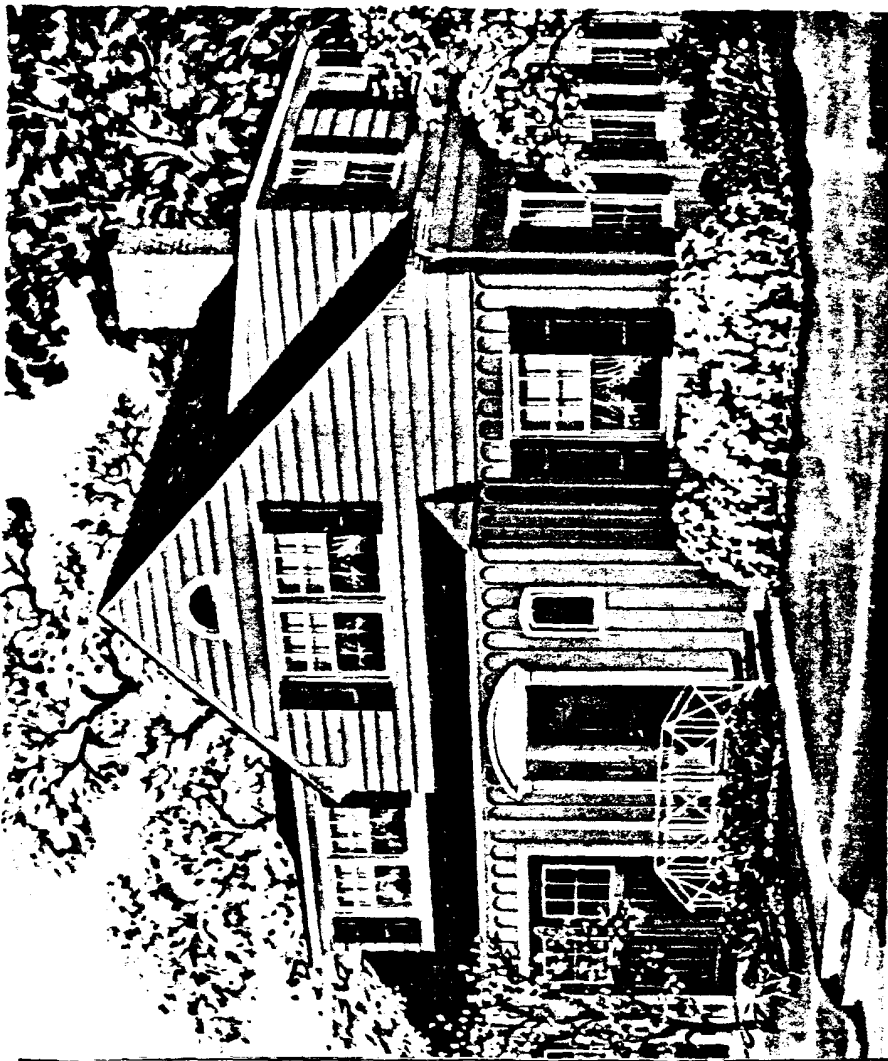

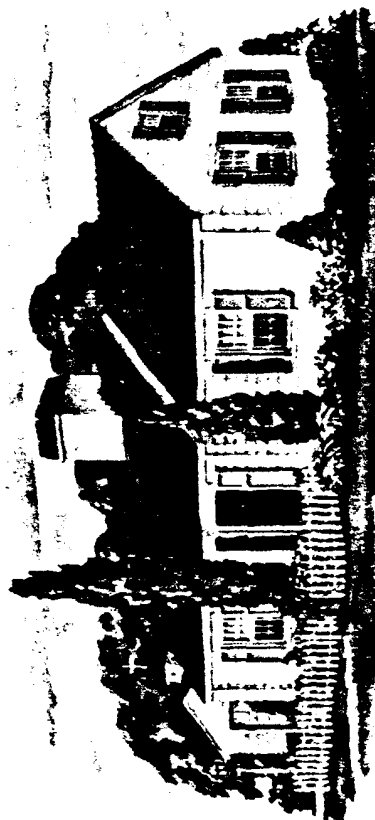
Paint Point #8

A house can have a good location, be well designed and yet prove to be anything but attractive — simply because of a careless use of color.

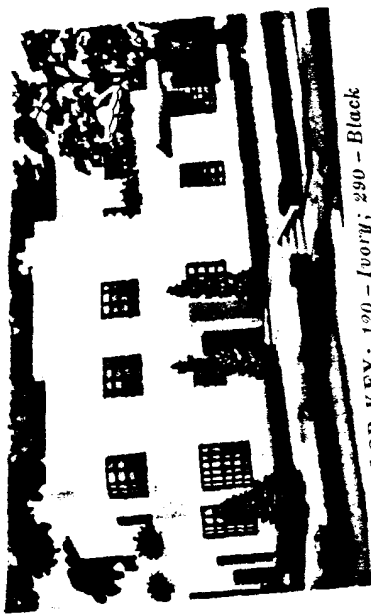
Consider carefully the color treatment of the trim spots. Such areas as doors, eaves, shutters, door and window frames and sash, although requiring a comparatively small amount of paint, are the "window dressings" of your home. Properly decorated they reflect your good taste.

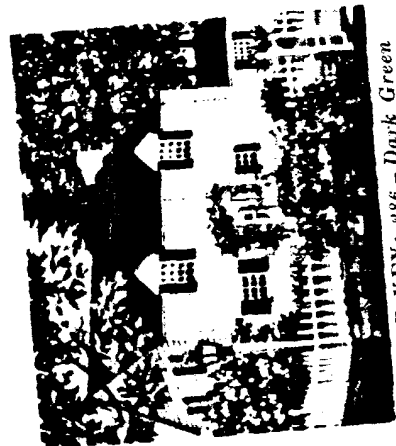

Paint Point #9

The painter who knows his business does not paint a surface while it is directly exposed to intense sunlight, not because he is thinking of his own comfort, but because of the possible effect on the paint job. Painting a too-hot surface can cause a number of troubles that may seriously affect the life of the paint. For one thing it will dry the paint too fast; cause uneven brushing. It may also thin out the oil and allow the paint to run.

*A*LL PAINT should be well mixed before application. Perhaps the best method is to pour all the paint into a larger container. It should then be stirred with a lifting motion until completely uniform. A strong paddle is best for this purpose. It should be remembered, too, that the paint ought to be stirred occasionally while being used.

The surface to be painted should be clean and dry. All loose or scaling paint should be scraped or burned off. If there is blistering, all construction defects that allow moisture to get behind the paint film should be repaired.

It's important, too, that the paint be applied only in good weather — not when it's damp, stormy or when there's a likelihood of a sudden temperature drop to near

freezing. Outside painting should not be done in the late evening, and no surface should be painted directly exposed to intense sunlight. The paint should be brushed enough to spread it evenly, and one gallon will cover 500 square feet with the Primer-Undercoater and 600 square feet for the finish coat.

Sappy streaks or knots should be smoothed out with shellac after the first coat of paint is on. Blistering and similar defects should be puttied and sanded. In addition, if metal surfaces not usually painted, such as screens and door hardware, are kept painted, avoid the possibility of unsightly staining and rust on the surface.
