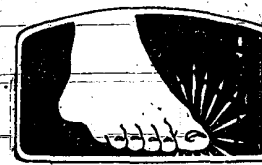

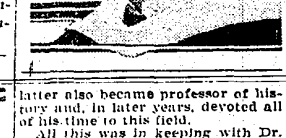

latter also became professor of his-
tory and in later years devoted all
of his time to this field.
All this was in keeping with Dr.
Wheeler's dream of carrying edu-
cation to the great masses instead
of confining it to a chosen few.
Ever alive to public demands and
the diversified interests of a state
rich in resources which needed de-
velopment, Dr. Wheeler fostered
science and business with equal
emphasis. He sought funds for
experiments to aid the farmer.
In 1819 there were ten persons on
the faculty of the college of agri-
culture. The present magnitude of
this phase of university work
speaks for itself. Facilities to fos-
ter trade were introduced. A school
of naval architecture and engineer-
ing was established because Dr.
Wheeler recognized the eminent
position which shipbuilding had
taken in the San Francisco bay re-
gion and which in his words "made
it incumbent upon the university
to furnish the best instruction in
what now had come to be a char-
acteristic California art."

GRADUATE DIVISION.

To encourage research the gradu-
ate division was organized, to
which have since been attracted stu-
dents and experts from all corners
of the world. In his first report to
the governor in 1900 Dr. Wheeler
set forth a long list of pressing
needs for the university he had
planned across the continent to guide.
It is to his credit that the majority
of these needs, representing invest-
ments and appropriations of many
millions of dollars, have been met.
There are still a few of his dreams
to be realized. Chief among these
is an art building, with which he
would combine a department of
archaeology.

How Dr. Wheeler's great dream
of an "ideal" university inspired
hundreds of persons to give of their
wealth to the state institution of
learning is related by Dr. Deutsch
in his biography.

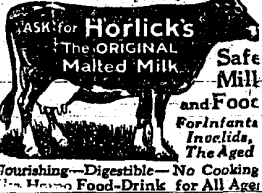
"President Wheeler was the
man who struck the rock from
which these waters flowed," says
Dr. Deutsch in relating the many
benefactions which came to the
university in the two decades of
the Wheeler regime.

While recognizing material needs,
President Wheeler placed his great-
est stress on human values, and
sought the one only for what it
could do for the other. In his
presidential capacity he looked
first and foremost to his "boys and
girls" in the student body. To
them he gave student self-govern-
ment and the honor spirit in exam-
inations. In the words of the writer
of his biography he was "a ben-
efactor of students," and delegated
none of his cherished powers of
leadership in this respect to others.
Dr. Wheeler's own college career
had been the kind to inspire the
courage and manliness of a com-
mander and guided. He was
prominent in student activities in
the class of 1875 at Brown Univer-
sity, and at the same time, achieved
distinction as a scholar.
He was a member of his class crew
and played left field on class and
varsity baseball teams. After grad-
uation there followed a career as
high school and college teacher;
studies and travel in Europe hon-
ors and degrees bestowed upon
him, and, in 1886, a call from Cor-
nell where he remained for 13
years.

CORNELL ACTIVITIES.

At Cornell Dr. Wheeler became
the connecting link between fac-
ulty and students. It was his in-
terest in students and the commu-
nity at large, his ability as a pub-
lic speaker, and his activities in
the realm of politics that made him
be adjudged "presidential timber"
in the words of Dr. Deutsch. Small
wonder then, points out his biog-
rapher, that tributes should come to
him from all parts of the world.
Thirteen universities and colleges
in this country and Europe con-
ferred honorary degrees upon him.
In 1895-96 he served as professor
of the Greek language and litera-
ture in the American School of
Classical Studies in Athens. While
there he participated in the first
excavations of the site of ancient
Corinth and was judge at the
final finish of the track sports at the
first revival of the Olympic games.
Of all the honors which came to
Dr. Wheeler in his versatile career,
Dr. Deutsch sets forth as the most
important bestowed upon him dur-
ing his term as president of the
University of California, his ap-
pointment as Theodore Roosevelt
professor in the University of
