Liquor License Revoked for Good in Monterey

The liquor license at the Golden Keg (Peninsula Wine House), 143 E. Franklin St., Monterey, has been permanently revoked. Asst. Police Chief Frank Marinello announced today.

Marinello said he was informed the revocation became effective immediately.

The license was suspended several months ago but the place was allowed to remain open pending an appeal. The appeal has been turned down.

Marinello said the operators, Mr. and Mrs. Benny Nieastro, were charged with several ABC violations, including selling liquor to minors and employing female bartenders.

Taxable Business Shows Increase in County

Monterey County's taxable business amounted to \$44,523,000 during the second quarter of 1957. It was announced in Sacramento yesterday by George R. Reilly, first district member of the State Board of Equalization, as part of a state report.

This total exceeded the figure for the same period of 1956 by 1.5 per cent and represented .88 per cent of the state total of \$5,079,000,000.

Self-assessed transactions in the county subject to the state's 3 per cent sales and use taxes during the period added \$1,353,750 to the state's general fund. Total collected from counties through this tax amounted to \$12,747,950.

Redevelopment

Approved by the Seaside Redevelopment Agency last night was a resolution asking the Federal government for a \$41,693 grant to study a redevelopment program in Seaside.

Before the application for federal funds goes forward, the city council will consider a similar resolution next Thursday night.

Upon receipt and subsequent approval of the application, the federal government will advance \$41,693 for a four-month study of a preliminary project to determine the city's eligibility. The additional \$30,000 will be advanced for detailed study should the preliminary survey indicate a project is feasible.

Also approved were two resolutions setting personnel policies and a plan of organization of the agency.

Pacific Grove Judge To Return

Judge Richard Eldred of Pacific Grove Justice Court will return Monday from Santa Monica, where he has been attending the State Judges, Marshals and Peace Officers convention this week.

Also attending the Santa Monica convention is Pacific Grove Police Chief Ernest McAnaney, who was scheduled to go there from the international police chiefs convention in Honolulu. McAnaney is combining the conventions with his vacation.

\$76,559 for County in Highway Taxes

Monterey County received last month \$76,559 as its share of the \$27,102,876 collected by the state for the month of August through highway users' taxes.

In a report from Sacramento yesterday, Robert C. Kirkwood, state controller, said that of the total money collected \$6,394,064 would go to counties. \$2,574,663 would go to the State Highway Fund for distribution to cities, and \$18,134,161 would go to the fund for expenditure on highways.

Day Festival Near Monterey • Jack Dougherty, owner of the resort establishment, Casa Munras, in the California city of Monterey, extended, as delegate of the Mayor of his hometown, to Oberburgermeister Thomas Wimmer an invitation to an "Original Oktoberfest" at Fort Ord near Monterey.

The American festival, patterned exactly after that of Munich, will have tents for beer, areas of amusement, and sausage grills with mountains of sausages of every kind. Only the date and duration are different. Monterey's Oktoberfest will be celebrated from October 11th to 13th and is therefore one step ahead of its big brother in Munich in that it is a genuine Oktoberfest. (In Munich the Oktoberfest is in September, when one drinks March beer).

The idea was brought home to Monterey by citizens who served as officers with the 5th U.S. Infantry Division in Bavaria and who became so attached to the Oktoberfest that they do not want to miss it even at home. The proceeds of the event in Monterey will go to seven orphanages in the Munich area.

As Oberburgermeister Thomas Wimmer explained to us, he is highly pleased to receive the invitation, but unfortunately, as a result of important official work coming up at the specified time, he cannot attend. Moreover, he declared that the flight to the western part of the American continent for the few days of the U.S. Oktoberfest is much too expensive.
