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NLRB Accuses Dock Union

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—AP.—The National Labor Relations board today accused the CIO National Maritime union of continued violation of the Taft-Hartley act in the manner of a board ruling.

The board issued the board court of appeals in New York to order the union to stop the law in its dealings with Four Great Lakes shipping companies.

It was the first time the labor board had gone to court to obtain enforcement of a ruling it had issued under the Taft-Hartley act.

If the court issues the order, the union must either obey it or face contempt of court charges.
