VINYLITE Resin CYNV

We have been manufacturing polyvinyl chloride and polyvinyl chloride-acetate resins for over twenty-five years and have handled many millions of pounds in our plant during that period. During that time no problems have arisen in the handling or storage of this material and, as far as we know, our customers have never had difficulty, either from the point of view of explosibility or toxicity of the resin dust. We were under the impression that the Bureau of Explosives had examined the dust of polyvinyl chloride resins for any explosive hazard and had found them to be non-combustible and non-explosive. However, we have been unable to locate the report, if such a report exists.

Polyvinyl chloride resins are considered non-toxic by the Division of Pharmacology of the Food and Drug Administration. From an article appearing in ASSOCIATION OF FOOD & DRUG OFFICIALS OF THE UNITED STATES, Vol. IV, No. 3, July 1951, page 83, we quote in part as follows:

"As a general rule, resins are so insoluble as a class that the chances of contamination by the solvent action of foods are rather slight. The types of resins considered suitable for food use are: Polyvinyl chloride, Polyvinyl acetate, Polyvinyl chloride-acetate"

With reference to your letter of September 12 on this subject, we have no knowledge that VINYLITE resin QYNV has been tested by the Bureau of Mines. Experience has shown that dusts of other 100 per cent polyvinyl chloride resins (QYNA, QYSQ, QYSM and QYSJ) are non-explosive and non-combustible, therefore QYNV should present no such hazard.

Mr. J. J. Correnti of Johnson & Johnson called recently and asked us to send him a letter indicating that VINYLITE resin QYNV was non-hazardous under handling and storage. If QYNV has ever been tested by the Bureau of Mines and there is a report giving test data indicating that the dust from QYNV is non-combustible, we would appreciate very much receiving a transcript of it. This information together with some data on toxicity will be sent Johnson & Johnson so that the State of New Jersey can be satisfied that the storage of the material presents no hazard.
