THOMPSON MADE HIT
THAT COST FIFTEEN.

ANOTHER COLORED MAN LEARNS
THAT PROFANITY IS COSTLY.

Burglar Ivensch Held to Answer for
His Crimes—Ordway in Hock Again
for Scott Burglary—Chinaman Fined

It cost Rufus Thompson \$15 yes-
terday to hit another colored man
named McCoy. Rufus is a cheap prize
fighter and trainer of that class of peo-
ple, and was one of the interested par-
ties in the mill that was pulled off last
night. He probably could not wait until
the regular fight to get himself ex-
cited, so he opened up on a fellow-cit-
izen yesterday morning. McCoy and
Thompson had a little disagreement at
a lodging-house on New High street,
and to enforce his views Thompson
landed a left swing on McCoy. The
blow made him groggy, and soon after
he came to his senses he rushed off to
the Police Station and swore out a com-
plaint against Thompson for battery.
The fellow was arrested, and when
asked about the transaction in Justice
Austin's court Thompson, blushing
admitted that he had merely pushed a
man over and he "got scared." The
scare must have been a good one, for
the court found Thompson guilty and
sentenced him to pay \$15 or serve the
same number of days in jail.
