I'm a reporter at KRCC, the NPR station in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and I'm hoping to reach you this evening for comment on a quick-turn piece set to run tomorrow morning. The piece is an interview with an attorney who has long been working on cases related to PFC contamination. In it, he alleges that the legislation governing the regulation of toxic chemicals in drinking water hasn't been effective in protecting people from PFC contamination.
