Dear Dr. Edgar:

I am sending you herewith a letter and enclosures from Mr. Jordan. I replied to the letter saying that I felt that this was a matter in which it would be advisable to consult the Public Health Service, and that in any case I was passing the letter along to you for such action as you might wish to take.

I think you will understand that I do not choose to make any recommendation. In a general way the signs serve no very useful purpose. However I should consider it good policy to continue their use, and under those circumstances it seems to me important that they be continued in a manner satisfactory to the Public Health Service. I considered the possibility of raising the question with Dr. Sayers, but it seems to me more fitting that any action which is to be taken in the matter should come through your hands. I do not now, and never did, regard these signs as of actual significance in relation to the public health. Consequently I hesitate to take any action with regard to them.
