MINUTES OF THE MEMBERSHIP MEETING OF THE REFRACTORIES INSTITUTE

Held Sept. 11 and 12, 1958 at The Broadmoor, Colorado Springs, Colo.

Total attendance including guests was 23 men. Forty-three kinds of members were also present to attend the special functions. Attendance list is appended.

President J. E. Brinckerhoff presided and Avery C. Newton acted as secretary of the meeting.

Minutes of the last membership meeting held at The Homestead, Hot Springs, Va., on May 8 and 9, 1958, previously submitted by mail, were approved.

F. H. Laube, Treasurer, presented the financial report for the five months' period April 1 to Aug. 31, 1958, copy appended. This report was received and ordered placed on file.

W. H. Peterson, Jr., Chairman of the Men's Golf Committee, reported on the rules of play for the golf tournament.

The President announced that the Board of Directors at their prior meeting on Sept. 11 had accepted with regret the resignation of John L. MacFarlane as Director of The Refractories Institute. William T. Tredennick was nominated and unanimously elected a Director to fill the vacancy and to serve until the next annual Spring election.

W. A. Turner, Chairman of the Mellon Institute Committee, thereupon presented the report of his committee, copy appended.

It being nearly noon, the meeting adjourned until 10:00 A.M. the following day.

Upon resuming the sessions, the President reported on the current activities of The Institute and the several actions taken by the Board of Directors at their meeting on Sept. 11 as follows:

1. You may have found on the table at the entrance to the ballroom, a supply of Membership Rosters. These have just been published by The Institute and will be distributed to the entire membership by mail next week. They are for the personal use of our members only and are not to be given to outsiders.

2. Also on the table is a supply of posters announcing the rules for the 1959 Award Contest for the best papers on any phase of refractories. A supply of these posters will be mailed next week to associate as well as active members. You are urged to see that these posters are put up on the bulletin boards in your offices, plants and mines. Your employees have talents and abilities—urge them to enter the contest. We want a lot of entries. The three prize winners will present their papers at the 1959 Factory Operators Meeting and will receive engraved gold watches.

3. After discussion at the Board Meeting yesterday, it was decided that it would be impractical to attempt to

combine our Factory Operators Meeting with the 1959 program and hold the meeting in the fall of 1959. Our city having a ceramic engineering department, our Factory Operators Committee will therefore meet in Pittsburgh on Sept. 23 to pick a site for the Operators Meeting, plan a program and arrange for visits to refractory plants as they have done in the past. These meetings have proven to be highly successful in the past and of great value to our production personnel. Your continued support of this worthy Institute activity is appreciated.

4. Two thousand copies of the Refractories Bibliography covering the years 1948-1957, inclusive, will be printed and distributed before the end of October.

It will be a massive volume of over 2000 pages weighing about 6 pounds. Containing abstracts of all the literature and patents on refractories, it will have interest especially for ceramic engineers and research personnel of our member companies. This Bibliography, as you know, has been jointly financed by The Refractories Institute and the American Iron and Steel Institute at a total cost of \$60,000.

The Refractories Institute is taking 750 copies for free distribution among its members, depending on their use and need. We are also sending copies to the Ceramic Engineering Departments of the 17 universities and will hold in reserve about 100 copies.

The Iron and Steel Institute is likewise taking about 750 copies for free distribution among their members and technical libraries and research agencies in North America and Western Europe.

The balance of about 500 copies will go to the American Ceramic Society for storage and subsequent sale at \$7.50 per copy to cover their costs of handling and mailing.

5. The Board of Directors discussed a number of new Institute activities of possible interest to the membership. These activities will be explored and in some cases questionnaires will be sent to the membership to determine the degree of interest and participation. Some of these proposed activities are:

Special committees to serve the peculiar interests of sub groups of the industry such as the Special Refractories Association, the Hot Top producers and others.

A committee of standards to explore and recommend uniform standards of packaging castables, mortars and plastics, similar to our packaging recommendations.

The collection of statistics from the industry by an outside accounting firm and reporting in totals of refractories shipments by industrial consumer classifications, such as iron and steel, glass, power plants, etc.

The collection and reporting annually of such information as:

1959 Spring Membership Meeting June 25-26 at The Greenbrier, White Sulphur Spring.

6. A committee of the Board had been selected at the previous meeting to explore the advisability of extending the territorial scope of the membership beyond the present boundaries of the United States, Canada and Mexico. The Institute had recently received applications and inquiries from refractories companies in the Dominican Republic, Argentina and as far away as Australia.

The committee recommended and the Board agreed that the present territorial limits of membership should not be extended. It was felt that the cost of maintaining distant memberships, making available the test facilities at our Pittsburg and furnishing technical and production know-how, would far outweigh the financial benefits to the Institute.

7. The Board discussed the question of holding future meetings at other locations than heretofore. The Secretary was instructed to submit at the next Board meeting the names of a number of likely sites. At present, we alternate each Fall between The Broadmoor and the Grand Hotel at Point Clear, Ala. Each Spring we alternate between The Greenbrier and The Homestead. The Secretary will appreciate receiving suggestions from the members.

Passing on to other matters, the President thereupon called on General Counsel, W. J. Kenney, who presented a report, copy appended, on the current status of percentage depletion.

The President then called on R. C. Shepard, President of The Denver Fire Clay Co., who introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Irving P. Knick, meteorologist and President of the Water Resources Development Corp. of Denver, Colo.

Dr. Knick gave a most interesting and informal talk on "Recent Developments in Weather Forecasting and Control." The numerous questions asked by the members at the conclusion of Dr. Knick's talk indicated the degree of interest in his remarks.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, upon motion, adjourned.

REPORT OF GENERAL COUNSEL

This is in the nature of a report of status rather than a report of progress in the depletion field.

There has been no substantial progress in the clarification of the refractories depletion problems since the spring meeting of The Refractories Institute in May, 1958.

However, certain straws can be reported, but only as measuring the velocity of the wind.

Treasury Legislative Efforts.—On April 25, 1958, the Treasury proposed an amendment to Section 613(C) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. The effect of this proposal would have been to establish a cut-off point for the refractories industry at the crushed and ground stage. However, the proposal did not provide any method to determine the value of crushed and ground clay. The Treasury proposals made no effort to solve this primary problem which has been plaguing the refractories industry for seven years. The Refractories Institute had requested an opportunity to express its views at a hearing to be held by the House Ways and Means Committee in July of 1958. These hearings have never been held. The Technical Amendments Act of 1958 was, however, recently adopted

to amend the Internal Revenue Code.

Percentage Depletion Regulations.—At the Treasury meeting on Treasury regulations, it was announced that a final revision of percentage depletion regulations originally proposed on November 8, 1957, would be published in June of 1959. This promise has not been fulfilled to date and there is no reason to suppose that they will be completed before the end of the year 1959. The refractories industry has made determined efforts to obtain a satisfactory revision of the percentage regulations to establish a method for valuing crushed and ground clays for percentage depletion purposes.

Internal Revenue Examination Policy.—The Internal Revenue Service has, in accordance with its announced policy, settled depletion cases involving products made solely from shale on the basis of end product depletion, following the *Cherokee* line of decisions. However, the Service has not yet announced its policy with respect to depletion upon products made entirely or in part from "refractory and fire clay". In the absence of such announced policy, Examining Agents have generally refused to grant end product depletion in such cases, except where the fire clay content has been minimal. The result has been an almost complete moratorium on settlement of depletion claims where refractory or fire clay is a material constituent of the product.

There seems to be little prospect for any overall betterment of the situation until the Service issues instructions to its examining and engineer agents, which probably can only come after final regulations are developed.

The March of the Cases.—Since the last meeting two end product depletion cases have reached trial, in both of which fire clay is involved as a major raw material constituent of the finished product. In both cases the government had countered the taxpayer's claim for end product depletion by asserting the existence of a market for raw lump fire clay and that this is the first marketable product upon the value of which depletion is to be computed.

In the Cannelton Sewer Pipe case in the U. S. District Court for the Southern District of Indiana the taxpayer claimed end product depletion on sewer pipe with a substantial fire clay content. The government contended that there was a market for raw fire clay, but the only raw clay sales produced in substantiation of this market were approximately 75 miles distant from the taxpayer's plant. The District Court held that these sales did not establish a market for raw fire clay in the area of Cannelton and allowed end product depletion to the taxpayer. This case will probably be appealed to the Seventh Circuit Court.

In the Sparta Ceramic Company case the taxpayer brought suit for end product depletion in the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Ohio. This case was reached for trial in Cleveland in August, 1958. The taxpayer is a manufacturer of small glazed and unglazed wall and floor tile and claimed depletion computed on sales of finished tile. The government contended the first marketable product was alternatively either (1) the value of raw clay; (2) the value of structural fire clay produced from #6 and #5 O¹ years 1951-53. These raw clays were used in manufacture of refractory products and a structural brick. The tonnage of raw fire clay

As you will note from the Treasurer's Report for the five months, April 1-August 31, 1955, income from this was \$19,700, disbursements were \$21,260, leaving a net loss to The Institute of \$1,560 for the period.

It is expected that the rate of loss will decline during the balance of our fiscal year, since the volume of test work is normally slow during the summer months and since the increased prices for tests did not go into effect until June 1, 1958.

A new bulletin has just been printed and distributed describing the tests on refractometers and showing the new rates as authorized by the Board of Directors at their May meeting. The test charges are increased an average of 15% in an attempt to offset the increased overhead charges at Mellon Institute.

W. A. Turner and Avery C. Newton visited Stuart Phelps, the Director of our Fellowship at Mellon, on August 19. Stuart reports a substantial current increase in interest for the lead years.

He showed us notes of devices used experimentally in the way of altering the original design of the portable consistency meter so as to be able to measure mixes of a stiffer consistency. This work is being done in an effort to comply with the suggestions made by some producers after laboratory trials with the equipment. The work is now in the stage of trials with a number of commercial testables, and it should not be too long before the revised test can be reevaluated in the field.

He also showed us new equipment, largely designed and assembled by the Fellowship staff, to record photographically the pressure and piston movement during dry pressing operations.

Mention was made of the thermal spalling test for silica brick, which the Fellowship began developing over 10 years ago. The test has not been used to any extent until recent years, but a number of laboratories have now installed the equipment and Committee C-3 of A.S.T.M. will discuss its adoption during the fall meeting of the Committee.

On 10/10/68, the Bureau advised that the FBI is currently conducting an investigation of the activities of the Communist Party, USA, in the United States and to ask them to start a campaign of "black and white" propaganda. The committee recommends that The Institute send a questionnaire to the membership seeking advice on the probable number of tests per year over a three year period which each member company might require. With this information, the committee will be in a better position to make a recommendation.
