Fred Linder, Ojai defense director, emphasizes the importance of maintaining interest and effort in civilian defense activities. At last week's meeting, there was a discussion of further training now being given at Ventura junior college. Two Ojai representatives, A. A. Herman and Lynn Rains, will attend those classes weekly, and on Thursday evening will convey the instruction received to local defense workers. This committee meets Tuesday and will continue for approximately six months. Emphasis is placed on fast changing methods and materials of warfare and problems arising therefrom which civilians must cope with. Another department allied with the defense council is the Red Cross disaster committee being planned under chairmanship of Rudolph Drewes.

The next civilian defense meeting is scheduled for Oct. 9. Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Bunce are home after spending a week on a fishing trip at Sonora pass. Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Newell are in Pomona for a three weeks' visit with their son, Charles, who is training to become a civilian instructor of airplane pilots.

CHAIRMAN NAMED
Mrs. Skiney Gest has been appointed chairman of the home service committee of the Ojai chapter of the Red Cross. She will work directly with army wives and army families, affording them the full facilities of the Red Cross in solution of all family problems. The service is designed both for the army people stationed here and for Ojai families having relatives in camp elsewhere.

A new class for Red Cross staff assistants will commence at headquarters Oct. 12. There will be 10 meetings, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Mondays through Fridays. Women who have had office experience, those who can type, and those who can take dictation are particularly needed. Activities of the local chapter are becoming more extensive and Mrs. M. R. Gragg, chairman, hopes for a large enrollment in the course. Persons who are not free to enroll as staff assistants may nevertheless attend the classes and secure background information that will be helpful in other branches of Red Cross work.

Willkie Assailed for Second Front Talk

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Chairman Tom Connally, D. Tex., of the senate foreign relations committee yesterday criticized Wendell L. Willkie for being "so free with his comments and newspaper headlines about a second front while in Russia."

Connally said it might be implied from Willkie's remarks that there was "friction" between the governments of Russia, and the United States.

Speaking in the senate after Sen. James M. Mead, N. Y., had advocated action by U. S. troops in the Pacific, Connally in the bombing and cooperation with Britain to seizure of Dakar, Connally said that such utterances were "harmful" because they are interpreted abroad as reflecting the official attitude of the government.

Bound over to superior court after a preliminary hearing yesterday, Benjamin F. Bieg, Piru oilworker, today was free on \$750 bail as he awaited further trial for asserted assault with a deadly weapon—a cement block.

Robert Stoker, also a Piru oilworker, signed the complaint on his release this week from Foster Memorial hospital, where he was taken Sept. 19 as the result of a private road dispute in which Bieg allegedly "hit him on the head with a rock." The "rock" was a hefty chunk of cement, sheriff's officers said.

Stoker had told deputies they came to blows in an argument over use of the road, running to a Piru oil lease.

3 SHIPS PER DAY FOR U.S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—American shippers reached the goal of three ships a day during September when they delivered into service 93 new cargo vessels of all types, the maritime commission announced today.

Rear Admiral Howard L. Vickery, vice chairman of the commission, said the construction of a deadweight tonnage of 1,009,800 during September was "the most outstanding ship production record ever achieved in world history."

The construction of 93 new cargo vessels in a single month approximates the production of the entire year of 1941, officials said.

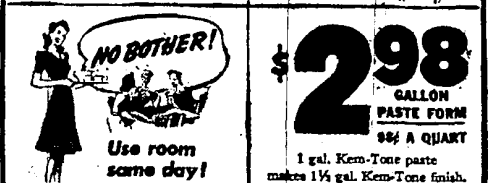
