

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 10. (AP)—The wreckage of an army "A-17" type attack plane which crashed last night into Coos Bay, 400 miles off its course, yielded the body of Major Roy P. MacDonald, 44, to rescuers today.

The major, attached to the 43rd air base group, Hamilton Field, Calif., apparently was killed outright as the plane settled into shallow water and nosed over while attempting a landing on the beach.

Lieut. J. J. Trauernicht, 35, field artillery reservist who accompanied Major MacDonald on a routine flight from Salt Lake City to Hamilton Field, was thrown clear and waded 30 feet to shore.

Trauernicht said they became lost when the radio beam failed. MacDonald's body was recovered by coast guardsmen from the Coos Bay station.

Army officials at Hamilton Field plan an investigation to learn how the pilot came to be so far off his course in clear weather.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 10. (AP)—President Roosevelt's personal emissary to China flew back to Washington tonight closely guarding the details of what he learned during an intensive three-weeks study in Chungking, capital of China.

Lauchlin Currie, administrative assistant to the president, hurried through San Francisco from the California clipper to a transcontinental plane which was kept waiting for him to complete his 25,000 aerial round trip.

In Chungking Currie and Emile Despres, senior economist of the federal reserve board, conferred with leading Chinese officials, the American ambassador, visited arsenals, airports, military training schools and industrial cooperatives. Currie brought the personal greetings of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek to President Roosevelt.
