

'MAD GAS' CLAIMS THIRD VICTIM AS 17 MORE FALL ILL

Prosecutor Starts Rigid Inquiry
to Fix Blame for Unconquer-
able, Inexplicable Malady.

LATEST VICTIM SUCCEUMBS,
BOUND IN STRAITJACKET.

Violent Poison Baffles Physi-
cians—Plant to Stay Closed;
Expert to Inspect Stations.

Clamped in a straitjacket on an iron cot in Reconstruction Hospital, William McSweeney died yesterday, the third victim of the strange gas fumes in the Bayway, N. J., plant of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, which drives men mad and then kills them.

McSweeney died at 2 o'clock in the morning. His relatives took his body home to No. 815 Fulton Street, Elizabeth, N. J. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon there came twelve more men to the ward which "loonly gas" has filled. Last night there were seventeen men in the hospital in varying stages of the ailment the gas produces. Two were hurrying down the path McSweeney took, trying to outrun the threatening bands of men which "loonly gas" had pictured in their minds. They were Herbert Fuson of No. 518 Grier Avenue and William Kregge of No. 184 Summer Street, both Elizabeth, N. J., who had been admitted to the hospital on Saturday. They were in straitjackets. Their condition was described as critical.

Some of the men in the hospital appeared to be close to recovery. They had left their beds and lounged about the sunlit rooms. But such is the mystery about the gas and its effects that Dr. C. K. Smith, house physician, would not predict when they would be ready to leave the hospital, nor whether their recovery is real or temporary.

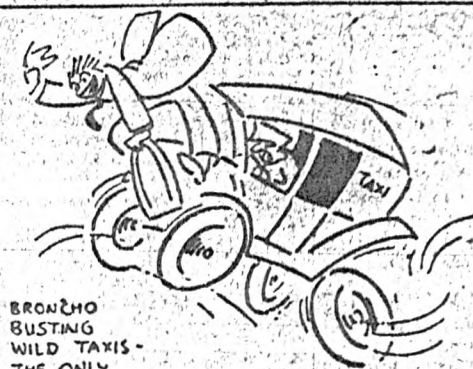
Physicians in Quandary.

"This is a new thing," he explained. "We don't know what may happen. We must keep them under observa-

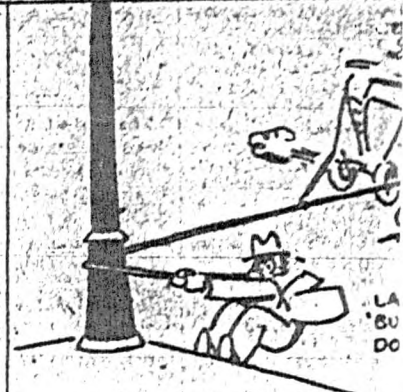
tion. When the doctors in the Reconstruction Hospital were fighting bared with an intangible enemy they did not put their skilled fingers on. Bayway laboratory stood closed the simple placard on the door laboratory Temporarily Closed."

Public officials moved uncertainly to bat this unknown danger. Prosecutor A. J. David of Union County, who includes the Bayway plant, announced he was investigating and will see all the evidence he can get before the Grand Jury next week before it is dismissed. He retained Dr. A. E. Edol, Newark chemist, to analyze the "Looney Gas." Under his orders, Dr. Edol and John A. Galatian, County Detective, went to the Bayway plant and questioned J. R. Carringer, its superintendent. From Mr. Carringer Dr. Edol obtained a sample.

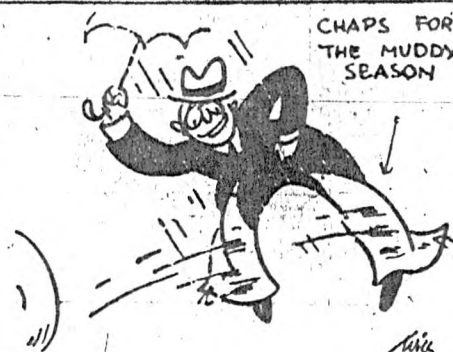
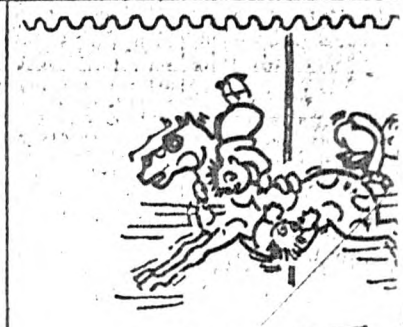

Buried Pueblo, 3,000 Years Old, Once Housed 20,000 in Nevada

M. R. Harrington Brings First Detailed Description of
Ancient City—Ruins Six Miles Long by Half
Mile Wide.

RENO, Nev., Oct. 28.—The first detailed account of a buried Pueblo city, which 3,000 or more years ago housed probably 20,000 people in Southeastern Nevada, was brought to Reno yesterday by M. R. Harrington of the Museum of the American Indian of New York City, who returned from a ten-day investigation.

"The ruins, covered with sand, run in a continuous line six miles and are about a half-mile wide," he said.

"The outlines of houses of stone and adobe and stone pavements are clearly seen. Cornerstones jutted out of the sand, and here and there the rectangular ground plan of a house could be seen. Everywhere were myriads of pieces of broken pottery.

"Some of the stone was dressed, 18 by 12 inches, and sometimes rough slabs were on edge and the adobe

"We found cornucobs about three inches long and evidence that the people lived on the fruits of the chase and agricultural products. We found arrowheads and bones of deer."

The first clue to the existence of the buried city was from Jebediah Smith, who, in a letter written in 1827 to William Clark, Superintendent of Indian Affairs and member of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, told of visiting the district. However, no scientist ever had viewed the site until last week.

An expedition is being organized to uncover some of the buildings.
