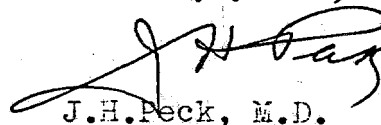
Dear Doctor;

Have just finished your article " Industrial Lead Poisoning as a Clinical Syndrome", and enjoyed it very much. I have had the care of men in a lead smelter for twenty five years and feel that your work covers the ground better than any that I have read.

There are two things I would like to ask you. In your experience, is coronary disease more frequent in lead workers than other forms of manual labor? Doctors' Alice Hamilton and Aub say no, but my records show an increase. Another sign to which I put some importance; a case of colic may show point tenderness, but if you place your hand flat on the abdomen and exert quite a bit of pressure, the lead colic sufferer remarks of his own accord, "That feels better",
