***** Minutes *****

1. President Rainey called the meeting to order at 9:40 A.M., and asked each person in attendance to stand and identify himself and his company affiliation. He mentioned that it was particularly gratifying to have the following company officials present at this Annual Meeting: Mr. W.S. Simpson, President - Raybestos-Manhattan, Inc.; Mr. S.R. Zimmerman, Jr., Exec. Vice President, Raybestos-Manhattan, Inc.; Mr. E.H. Wells, Vice President & Gen. Mgr., Johns-Manville Corp.; Mr. W.L. Wylie, Vice President & Gen. Mgr., UNIROYAL, INC. Also welcomed to the meeting were: Geo. S. Pabel, President of A.T. in 1949-1950; Dr. L.J. Cralley, U.S. Public Health Service; and P.C. Phillips, Marketing Manager of UNIROYAL, INC.

2. The minutes of the last meeting were presented for reading. Mr. J.A. Brown, Jr., moved that reading be omitted; seconded by Mr. N.L.A. Martucci. So voted.

3. The Financial Report was presented by Treasurer Martucci. Mr. B.A. Schuman moved that report be accented; Mr. J.A. Brown, Jr. seconded the motion, and it was so voted. The Report is attached to these minutes.

4. Mr. P.Jay Flocken, Legal Counsel, discussed some of the legal aspects of voluntary product standards and certification programs. Mr. Flocken first analyzed the antitrust considerations relevant to individual company and trade association participation in the initiation, formulation, and approval of voluntary standards. He stated that standardization or simplification have been attacked in cases alleging price-fixing where such a program was utilized as part of broader effort to secure uniformity of prices or to limit production and to indirectly reduce price competition.

The legality of a standards program does not depend upon the mere existence of an agreement to standardize but upon an appraisal of the program in the setting of all the circumstances, counsel stated. He briefly reviewed several cases including United States v. National Malleable and Steel Castings Company, The Douglas Fir Plywood Association and Asbestos-Cement Pipe cases.

Counsel also discussed two forms of certification, self-certification by a producer that a product complies with a given standard and third-party certification by a trade association or testing laboratory in conjunction with a registered certification mark under the trademark laws. Counsel discussed various specific certification marks registered under the Lanham Act and the provisions of that act providing for cancellation of a mark if the registrant discriminates or refuses to certify goods or services which meet the standards involved. Counsel noted that two requisites for a valid certification program using a trademark are "control" of use of the mark and availability of the mark to anyone maintaining the standards which the mark certifies, whether or not a member of the certifying organization. In this regard, the Supreme Court's decision in the case of Radiant Burners v. American Gas Association was noted.

5. The Fibre Producers Report was given by Mr. M.P. Carson, Vice President - Sales, Asbestos Corporation Limited. He mentioned the slow economic conditions in several countries had adversely affected total shipments of Canadian asbestos fibres in the first eight months of this year - down 8.8% - however, total sales of spinning fibres were up about 1% in that period. Group 4 fibres for use in asbestos-cement products were off, as were spinning fibre sales in Italy, France and Germany. Japan has made a good recovery. The embargo on Rhodesian fibre continues. However, some Rhodesian is reaching markets thru a third country.

6. President Rainey introduced Dr. Clinton H. Whitehurst, Jr., Dept. of Industrial Management, Clemson University, Clemson, S.C. who gave a most interesting talk entitled: "Operations Research Techniques". We were privileged indeed to have the opportunity to hear Dr. Whitehurst, a well-known authority in the field of

Industrial Management. An abstract of his talk follows:

ABSTRACT

"It is profoundly erroneous truism, repeated by all copy books and by eminent people when they are making speeches, that we should cultivate the habit of thinking of what we are doing. The precise opposite is the case. Civilization advances by extending the number of important operations which we can perform without thinking about them."

The above quotation by Alfred North Whitehead was both an introduction and, in fact, a summary of the address "Operations Research Techniques" delivered by Dr. C.H. Whitehurst of Clemson University before the Asbestos Textile Institute at Hilton Head, South Carolina on October 6, 1967.

In specific terms the address covered in capsule form ten OR techniques that could be utilized in a typical industrial organization. Each technique was illustrated by a simple example designed to show its potential as an aid to management decision making. Included were examples making use of linear programming, Markov processes, econometrics, multiple graphic correlation analysis, input-output models, matrix algebra, industrial dynamics, and a Monte Carlo simulation model. In each case the relevance of the technique to computer programming was emphasized.

The large number of techniques discussed was made possible by distributing handouts to the audience which contained the specific example, relevant technique, and at least one library reference. The handouts together with explanatory illustrations on an easel board was successful in imparting the potential for OR analysis in a firm's operations.

7. Jack Christian, President of Cassiar Asbestos Corporation Ltd., wrote the Secretary prior to this meeting that neither he nor Tom Tiggert would be able to attend due to the fact that their new Clinton mine, at Clinton Creek, B.C., was due to start production and they would be busy there. President Rainey asked Mr. Wm.J.W. Smith, Bell Asbestos Lines Limited, sales representatives for Cassiar, to tell us something about the new mine.

Mr. Smith said the Clinton Mine is 600 to 700 miles north of the present Cassiar mine, close to the border of Alaska. Problem of transporting fibre is somewhat similar to shipments from Cassiar. The type of fibre from the Clinton Mine is generally similar to Cassiar fibre, but there could be some considerable differences. There are both long and short fibres - but Clinton will produce primarily #4 Group fibres, and a secondary grade will be Group 5. Because yield from ore is never precisely known in advance, Mr. Smith stated that perhaps grades may be produced, other than those presently anticipated.

All four of the committee chairmen have now completed the normal two years service, and President Rainey expressed sincere appreciation on behalf of the Board of Governors and Members of the Institute for the faithful and efficient performance of their duties. A review of the minutes for the past two years gives abundant proof of the great amount of work done by each committee under their capable leadership.
