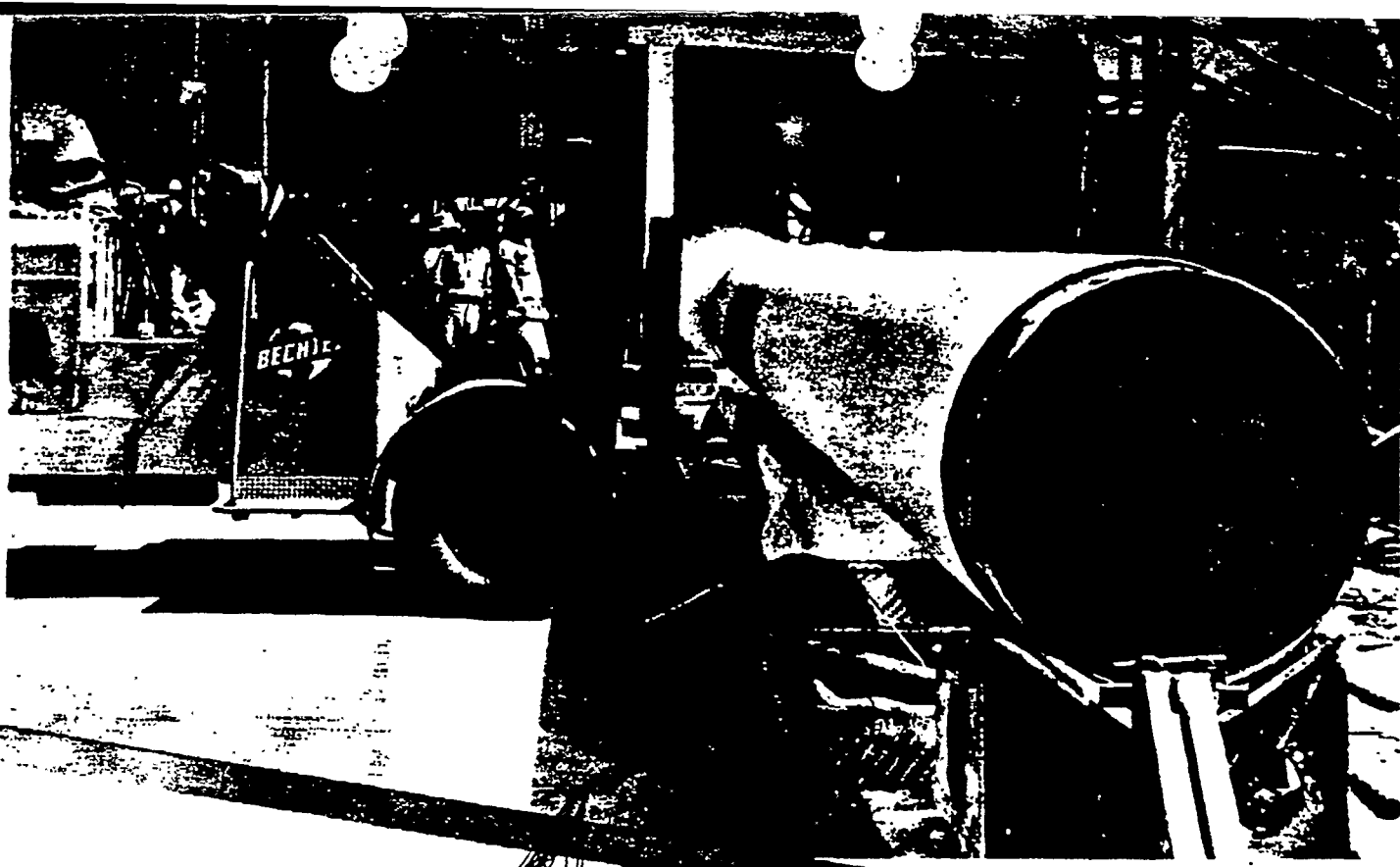
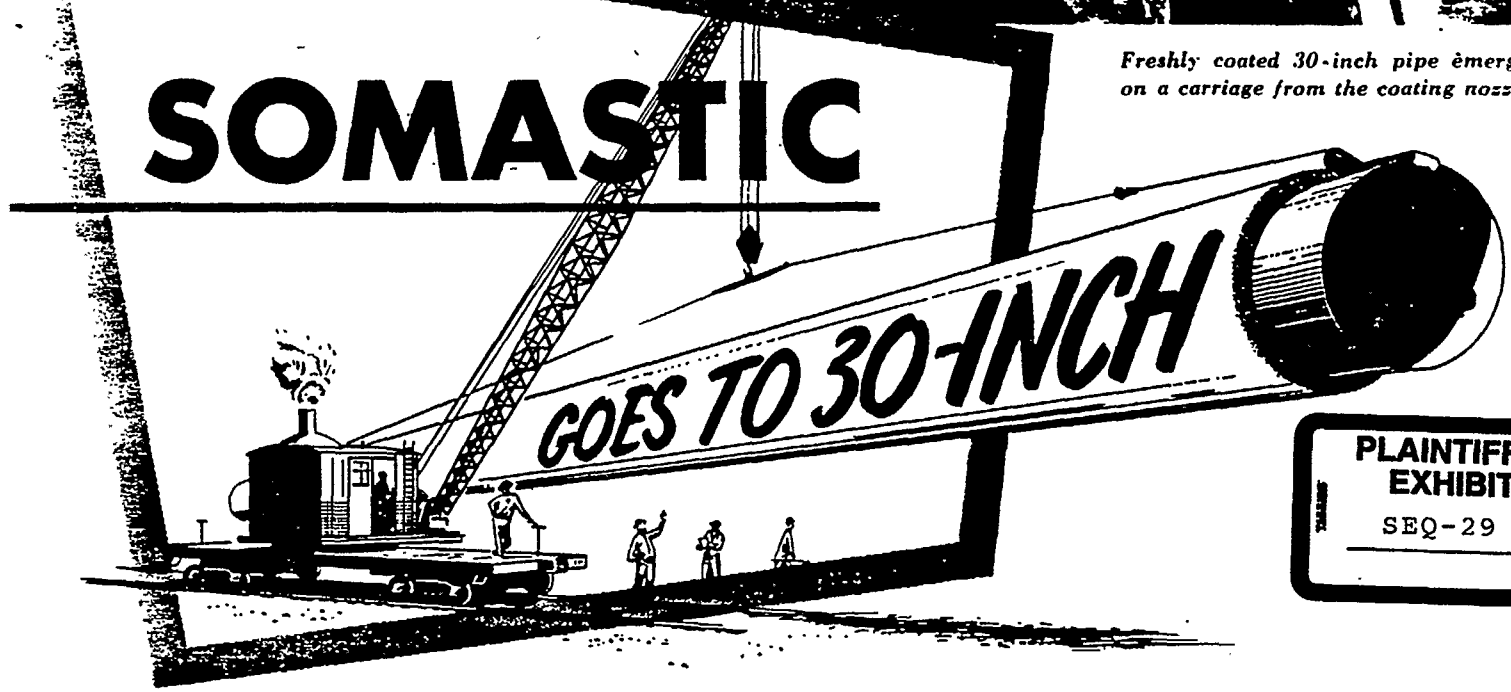

Freshly coated 30-inch pipe emerges on a carriage from the coating nozzle.



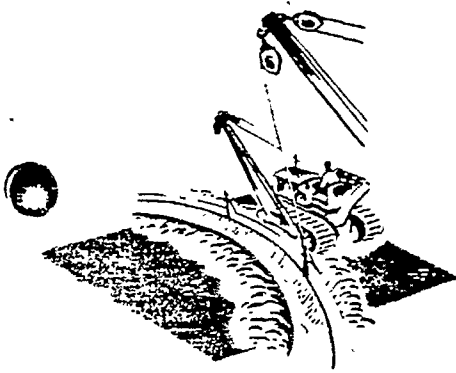

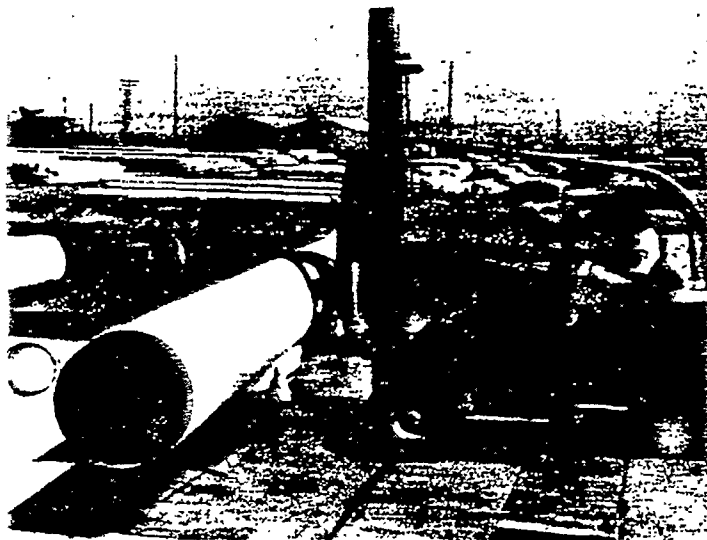

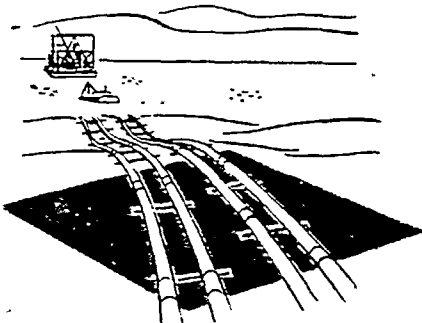
