Attached hereto is copy of letter from Dr. Kehoe to Mr. Webb regarding [REDACTED]

We feel that we ought to keep him on full pay for a period of two months and see how he is at that time. You can certainly assure him if he recovers within a reasonable length of time that we will do everything possible to give him a position with the company. Please let me know what is his condition, say, at the end of the year and we can then determine what we will do about him further.

I am awfully sorry that [REDACTED] is sick and wish you would extend to him my sincere hope that he will be able to get back to work in the near future.

In the meantime, you had better figure on employing another man because even if [REDACTED] does come back you will probably be able to use him. Let me know if you have any likely prospects and I will also see what we can line up from this end.
