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## WRITER TALKS TO STANFORD DAMES

World peace, the integrity of family life, careful character training for the rising generation and enforcement of prohibition were the four causes for which Kathleen Norris, novelist and lecturer, pleaded yesterday afternoon in a talk before the Stanford Dames Club. Mrs. Norris opened her address with an appeal to the college women of the world to do their part in advancing international peace and outlawing war. Reiterating her oft-expressed disagreement with Judge Ben Lindsey's companionate marriage plan, she urged the importance of family life and the preservation of the home. The younger generation, she said, is not on the high-road to destruction but is sorely in need of guidance and instruction in more wholesome ideals. Such instruction, Mrs. Norris held, is the primary duty of the parent. Deploping the prevalence of the hip flask, she progressed to the subject of prohibition. Although she admitted that it had not accomplished what had been hoped for it, she voiced her conviction in its ultimate success.

More than 70 members and guests of the club were present for the talk and the tea which followed.
