PERJURY CASE CONTINUED ON PLEA OF DEFENDANT.

Lapsley Attempts to Relieve Policeman Holleran of his Star—Comedy of Police Day—Lowe Gas Case Re-

The perjury case against J. T. Moxley was called in Justice Austin's court yesterday and upon request of his attorney, W. R. Bacon, was continued until this morning at 11:30. Even this amount of time was allowed with some hesitancy, as the complaining witness, T. C. Taylor and his wife, of Washington, D. C., are detained here to testify in the case.

Subsequent developments seemed to prove that what the defense wanted was to get at Mr. Taylor and attempt to arrange some sort of a compromise. Moxley and his attorney left the courtroom in advance of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor and sat opposite an open door so that the latter could not get out unseen. When they appeared, Moxley escorted them in the hallway, where the three stood and talked earnestly for more than an hour.

It is most unlikely that Mr. Taylor can be induced to withdraw the proceedings; but only the arrival of the hour fixed for the examination this morning will determine what headway Moxley made in that direction.

Moxley is charged with having sworn falsely in order to secure a divorce from his wife, who is living in Washington, D. C.
